Due to the current situation with the coronavirus, the first 2020 Huatung Choir Camp volunteer training was conducted online. 7th March, a total of 44 volunteers attended. In collaboration with Tourism Bureau's East Coast National Scenic Area and Soochow University Professor Wei-Gong Liu's research team, ACF created a map that guides visitors to slow travel in the Changbin and Fengbin townships. The map introduces unique cultural shops, workshops and restaurants; it identifies the specialties of each destination and even shares the ways of life of the people that run them. The project not only aims to guide visitors into slow traveling, but also aims to show the culture and humanity of the townships through its people. It hopes to inspire those who live in the region to have a deeper understanding of the local culture, and for those who are visiting to have an opportunity to really get to know and be in touch with the locals and their lifestyle.

The map can be found on brochure stands and includes introductions of local specialists. 


Junyi School of Innovation: Senior High School Tech Class

Junyi's senior high tech class combines tech and lifestyle. Tenth graders' course focuses on creative filmmaking and robotics programming. In creative filmmaking, students are tasked to mimic a YouTuber's video to experiment and explore the filming process behind the finished product. The lesson aims to also encourage students to express their ideas through filming. In robotics programming, students learn computational thinking through programming robotic cars. Through challenges, students learn to discover problems, problem solve and overcome challenges.

Junyi's twelfth graders combine tech with carpentry. They are tasked to reinvent products used in

daily life using tech and wood. Through the process, besides learning to code and redesigning products, students learn to appreciate working with wood practically.

total of 51 lead teachers attended. The workshop focused on enhancing coaching and mentoring

skills, and opened discussions on designing a process to guide mentees to think and discuss as a team during forums. International Associate of Facilitation and Certified Professional Facilitator Consultant Eric Tseng was invited to head the workshop. Tseng demonstrated meaningful dialogue, then led participants into sharing individual perspectives which uncovered different thoughts; eventually guiding them towards a co-growth outcome. The exercise gave Sharestart

lead teachers the opportunity to practice asking questions and listening. The workshop concluded with lead teachers openly sharing curriculum and material with the purpose of

receiving feedback. Every participant had a positive takeaway, exceeding expectations.
